Conservative Association Chairman's Report to Members

20 May 2020

I was tempted to rename this Report to the Covid Report, rather than Chairman's Report, but resisted. After all, whilst all of our lives are being affected by the current awful pandemic sweeping the world, and the number of people infected continues to rise, we have to carry on and ensure we are ready for when life starts returning to normal. As an Association, we continue to operate, to help people where we are able, to keep in touch with Members, and to plan and prepare for the future – as always. Fingers crossed, it does appear that we are entering the recovery phase of the coronavirus pandemic.

Virtual Events supported by CCHQ. As you would imagine, as your Chairman I am in very regular contact with CCHQ and Chairman from other Associations. One of the things we have been discussing is whether there is any merit in trying to organise an online Zoom (video call) event with a guest speaker. As the regional winner of the CCHQ Incentive Award Scheme last year, CENCA automatically qualifies for early support from CCHQ. The exact details of how it would work; how we would charge for event tickets; attendee participation etc are still being discussed, but I will update Members by email should it move forwards.

Unitary. Details of the new Unitary are now more comprehensive. The first meeting (of 151 Councillors via online Zoom video conference!), will take place at 7:00pm on Thursday 4th June 2020.

All current members of the five sovereign councils representing North Northamptonshire wards/divisions (East Northants, Wellingborough, Kettering, Corby and County) are automatically members of the Shadow Council, meaning that until the Unitary election in 2021 (there are no elections this year), there will be 151 Councillors of the Shadow Council.



The “Shadow Period” for the North Northamptonshire Council commenced on 11th May 2020, with Vesting Day for the new unitary authority to be 1st April 2021.

The meeting to be held on 4th June is effectively the Annual Council, and will determine certain administrative and housekeeping issues for the Shadow Council.

These will include electing a Chair, confirming committee membership, approving a Constitution and Code of Conduct etc.

Legislation has determined that the Shadow Council will be governed using Executive Arrangements. MHCLG dictate that the Executive Committee will consist of two councillors selected from each current sovereign authority (for East Northamptonshire that is Steve North (and David Jenney). Those members of the Executive will not “represent” their sovereign council, rather they will all work together to represent the Unitary Shadow Authority. The Government has also decided that Cllr Russell Roberts (BC Kettering), the Chair of the Leaders’ Oversight Board, will be the Leader for the Shadow North Northamptonshire Council and Cllr Martin Griffiths (BC Wellingborough), the Chair of the North Joint Committee, will be Deputy Leader.

The proposed governance (subject to Council approval) also allows for an Overview & Scrutiny Committee, a Standards Committee and a Senior Officer Appointments Committee. Councillor representation on these committees will be subject to political proportionality rules, following discussions with the recognised political groups on the Shadow Council.

Labour – a new Leader. So Jeremy Corbyn has finally left the building, and we now face a new Opposition Leader in Sir Keir Starmer. There is no doubt that he will pose a more serious threat than Mr Corbyn (stop laughing at the back).

As John Macdonald, Head of Government Affairs at the Adam Smith Institute think tank, recently stated, "Starmer is no doubt more popular than the previous leader. As it stands, this is almost entirely because he is not Jeremy Corbyn."

However we won't really know how strong the opposition is until life, and Parliament, starts returning to normal, and we can see how the public really viewed the Government's handling of the coronavirus pandemic.

Covid-19. There is absolutely no doubt, the current pandemic will change all of our lives forever. The financial impact will be felt for generations, and the way we live our everyday lives could take years to return to what we used to consider being normal, if indeed they ever do. Fortunately, we appear to be entering the "recovery phase", as I mentioned earlier, and we can but hope that we don't see a recurrence in the months and years to come.

You will all be aware of the current situation, after all the news seems to report on nothing but the pandemic, so I won't repeat the statistics or advice here. Save to say that, as we work through the financial recovery, reducing unemployment, helping businesses recover, and beginning again to interact socially in person, I hope that we all

remember what it was like to have to look out for our neighbours and the more vulnerable, to remember we are part of a community, to be aware of the importance of our key workers, and never stop doing that.

You should forward all suspected scam emails to:

report@phishing.gov.uk

This is the National Cyber Security Centre (part of GCHQ) which will analyse the email and they can remove the culprit sites.

Please spread the word.

Of course, knowing how the mind of the scammers works, they will probably start sending out emails pretending they are from GCHQ.

Anyway, the advice is: be on your guard.

These are the most abnormal of times that each and every one of us are living through at the moment and I first want to start by saying that I am hugely grateful to you and your family for your patience during this time of great challenge in all our lives, and I can entirely appreciate the frustration – as I feel it too.

The commemoration of VE Day on Friday 8th May was not the same as it would have been in normal circumstances, but it was a special moment where we all came together as a country to pay tribute to that generation, to remember their sacrifices, and to honour their legacy. I have to say I thought the programme of events came together beautifully as a fitting tribute and in the vast majority of instances we saw communities across the country come together in a managed, responsible, socially-distanced way. RAY JACKSON - LOGISTICS AND STATISTICS

21 May 2020.

They are undoubtedly brave and deserve our praise and admiration. I am writing of course of all the NHS staff who have been risking their lives day in and out to save us from Covid 19. It is an outstanding example of a sense of duty to the public expressed by mainly young people.

Having written that, why did the managers of the NHS allow two doctors, both Indian and both highly qualified to sacrifice their lives when their talents and experience are desperately needed for strategy and planning? The campaign has been badly fought and many good BritCits have died and their families devastated. There were no restrictions on money, authority, manpower, for example. It was Germany which showed the quiet confidence and skill and saved lives. We did not cotton on to this, but with month succeeding month there was time for second thoughts. Like many others I tried to follow events. My obvious yardstick was the number of dead reported each day. I hated the ever increasing numbers especially when I could no longer trust them. It was not possible to provide numbers at the weekend on the same basis as the weekday ones. Despite the large numbers of people involved there was no one to keep the system going seven days a week. The most obvious measurement, one which you would have thought the planners would have needed above all others, was not available.

Then we learned that deaths in the thousands of care homes had been excluded but were now being included.. The emphasis shifts to promises to do a large number of tests each week.

I failed to see the significance of this except

perhaps as a means of assessing the size of the problem. It would help presumably that it had gone over from 900 to 1000 per day. A hint of why the project was out of control was the incident when the Turkish Government promised to send us 4 million sets of protective clothing; the sort of promises handed out regularly to purchasing officers in industry. Typically the promise is followed by a delay because the goods are not ready – but could be if an alternative were acceptable from another source. Further delay because the second supplier has been tempted to sell them to another customer, but for a small increase would honour his commitment. (By this time our junior buyer smells the rat.) In our case the price increase is accepted if only to get the prime minister off the buyer's back. But delivery regrettably cannot be made because there is no transport. If the Brits could send a couple of heavy transport planes all would be well. So we do. And in the end the product is not fit for purpose. Now we can go back to wondering just why we have authorised so many test procedures. And BriCits continue to die.

Northamptonshire County Council News

The authority has reported an underspend of £641,000 for the 2019/20 financial year, adding to last year's underspend of £4.5 million.

The 2019-2020 position is based on a provisional outturn forecast and is still subject to change. The final figure will be confirmed in a report to cabinet in July.

This is the second year in a row that the budget has been balanced without the use of reserves, something which the council says had not been achieved in the previous 10 years. It also means that the authority now has £43.8 million in general and earmarked reserves. £23.8 million of that is earmarked, while the remaining £20 million may have to potentially cover any losses due to coronavirus. The finances appeared to have been turned around from the situation that the county council faced in 2017/18. but obviously the pandemic outbreak will now have a huge effect of the council's finances.

But the effect of the coronavirus pandemic is likely to leave a financial hole of between £14 million and £27 million for 2020/21. That is even after a £30 million handout from the Government.

Councillor Matt Golby, the Conservative leader of Northamptonshire County Council, said: "At one point in the recent past, our financial challenge stood at £64.2 million and we had a long road ahead of us.

"Since then, we have all worked extremely hard and made some real progress in our efforts to close the gap. The fact that we are able to report another end-of-year underspend – in addition to that delivered in 2018/19 – is a considerable accomplishment.

"This remarkable achievement goes to show the hard work and commitment of everyone involved in getting our finances back on track. Of course, our efforts will continue so that we can ensure we are in a strong position for the transition to the two unitary organisations.

In March, Northamptonshire County Council's cabinet agreed to endorse the purchase of two thermal repair machines to be used by KierWSP.

The machines are more environmentally friendly, cost just £35 per square metre compared to £90 per square metre using current methods, and would repair up to 100 potholes a day compared to 40 using traditional road repair methods.

The new machine had already been trialed in Wellingborough and East Northants, and according to the county council was scheduled to begin work in other areas in March.

However, the coronavirus pandemic has taken precedence in the county council's priorities.

Here's why. Our society and way of life are massively based on consumption of energy and resources. Right now, under lockdown that consumption is dramatically reduced and yet we are surviving. We may not be able to buy as much stuff or travel as much as we want but we are coping.

And here's the rub. Within Greta's SIMS (Extinction Rebellion version) game our economy is likely to plunge into a depression none of us have seen the like of.

Post thought. Perhaps there should be a SIMS Extinction Rebellion version it might help many realise that energy production cannot be changed by the wave of a magic wand.

CHANCELLOR'S FURLOUGH SCHEME UPDATE

12 May 2020

Chancellor Rishi Sunak announced an extension to the furlough scheme currently subsidising the wages of millions - but the Chancellor but we all know this cannot go on indefinitely.

At least 6.3 million people are currently having up to 80% of their salaries paid by the taxpayer under the furlough system at a cost of some £8 billion.

Mr Sunak has previously said he was preparing to "wean" workers and businesses off the programme - which currently runs until the end of June - but calls have been made for it to be prolonged.

But today he revealed his plans to continue the scheme until the end of October. Until the end of July there will be no change.

The government will ask companies from that point to share the cost of the scheme.

The Chancellor said the multi-billion pound subsidy, which had been due to end next month, will stay in place for four more months, and it will still cover 80 per cent of wages up to a ceiling of £2,500 a month.

With concerns the scheme is costing £14 billion a month - roughly equivalent to the NHS budget - Mr Sunak also told the Commons that from July it will be available for workers who go back part-time, in a bid to 'wean' businesses off the support.

'Firms will have to cover a proportion of wages if they take advantage of the 'flexibility', he said.

The announcement came despite speculation has been mounting that he would cut the proportion of pay to 60 per cent after the existing end date of July, as ministers urge people to return to work and loosen the lockdown strangling the economy.

BBC PANORAMA 4th May 2020

The edition of BBC1's Panorama in early May investigated the undeniably serious fiasco of PPE. Fair enough. The Government has many questions to answer.

It has since emerged that all five of the doctors and nurses Panorama chose to interview were longstanding Labour Party activists or supporters.

This was not shared with viewers, in what appears to be a flagrant breach of BBC guidelines.

This failure to level with its audience was almost certainly a breach of the Beeb's own guidelines. The following are the so-called experts in this field. Most of the interviewees' left-wing activism and criticisms pre-date the pandemic.

Mr Sunak told MPs: 'Until the end of July there will be no changes whatsoever.'

'Then from August to October, the scheme will continue for all sectors and regions of the UK but with greater flexibility to support the transition back to work.'

'Employers currently using the scheme will be able to bring furloughed employees back part-time.'

'And we will ask employers to start sharing with the Government the cost of paying people's salaries.'

'Full details will follow by the end of May.'

But some workers in sectors facing months more of uncertainty could reportedly receive supplements if they cannot return to work, or only return part-time.

Mr Sunak has insisted there will be no 'cliff edge' to the support, but admitted the scale of the bailouts are not 'sustainable'.

Boris Johnson's roadmap for releasing the lockdown, published on 11 May 2020, suggested that hospitality businesses and others like hairdressers and gyms, face being closed until July at the earliest.

Taking questions from MPs, Mr Johnson said: *'I do think that the furloughing scheme has been one of the most remarkable features of the Government's response and it is unlike anything seen internationally.'*

'Six-and-a-half million people currently are being supported. It is absolutely right that we should do it.'

Northamptonshire PFCC Stephen Mold's Newsletter

15 May 2020

These are very strange times we are living in. For the last few weeks, everyone has been rightly preoccupied with staying home, keeping safe and preventing the spread of this virus.

I have been out on patrol with Northamptonshire Police officers several times, to get a feel for how they are engaging with people and I hope that if you have comments to make you will email me.

Both Northamptonshire Police and Northamptonshire Fire and Rescue are working hard and in new ways and I felt the time was right to update you on some of the activities underway as both organisations continue to strive to keep you safe.

I have funded the purchase of 500 extra laptops to ensure that the Force retains capacity and is resilient and can allow staff to work from home. These laptops have allowed members of the Force Control Room with health conditions that put them in the 'at risk' category to work from home and for the first time, to receive calls from the public as they would in the control room.

No 999 or first contact 101 calls are managed by staff working from home in case the remote connection fails during a call: only those calls that have been triaged and risk assessed by someone in the FCR are routed to those working at home.

Staff working from home are currently able to receive and deal with inbound non-emergency calls, administrative functions, crime recording and processing of single online home reports received adding a valuable contribution to FCR daily business.

This initiative has ensured that there is no disruption to the service that the public receive,



and capacity has been maintained during the outbreak so far.

Northamptonshire Fire and Rescue Service have also taken on a variety of different roles to support the community and the response to the Covid 19 outbreak.

The Fire and Rescue Service will be among the six Fire and Rescue services across the East Midlands joining East Midlands Ambulance Service to commence training to support the response to COVID-19.

If the need arises in the coming weeks, fire service personnel will work alongside EMAS Urgent Care colleagues and will carry out support tasks such as driving Urgent Care vehicles and the safe moving and handling of patients.



Firefighters and staff from Northamptonshire Fire and Rescue Service have also been working with pharmacies to deliver essential medication to vulnerable people across the county. They will be delivering for community pharmacies and dispensing GP practices, which will free up pharmacy staff to cope with increased demand for support and advice, while also ensuring that vulnerable people are able to stay at home instead of coming out to collect medication.

I am proud of the way our emergency services have responded to the challenges of dealing with COVID 19 pandemic. I am equally proud of the work the force has been undertaken to deal with burglaries in the county.

The number of home invasions across Northamptonshire has reduced by over 34% in the first year Northamptonshire Police's dedicated burglary team has been operating, meaning that there have been 1,000 fewer victims of crime. The work also means that burglary overall is now at its lowest level since June 2008,



Operation Crooked is the Force's campaign to reduce home invasions - a crime which I asked the Chief Constable to make a priority. As part of the operation, the Burglary Team, which sits within CID, ensures that every burglary victim in Northamptonshire is guaranteed a visit from the police. The team also work to review and drive up the quality of investigations, manage and progress forensic hits, hunt down wanted people, organise police patrols in areas of concern and gather intelligence to prevent burglaries before they happen.

In one area of Northampton for example, burglaries have fallen by over 50%. Also, since the operation began, over 250 people have been arrested for burglary offences. This is fantastic news as people have told me that they wanted to see a focus on crimes that really affect their community like burglary and Northamptonshire Police have truly delivered. Not only has the Force cracked down hard on burglary, but they have also worked hard to explain to people how they can help to prevent crime and I am sure that all of these actions will have had a very positive effect on the confidence and safety of communities across Northamptonshire.
